6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

College follows the syllabus and curriculum designed by the Gondwana University. Hence, there is a little scope in Curriculum development as the college has to follow the curriculum developed by university. However some teachers are active members of Board of studies and faculty members involved in curriculum development.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Use of ICT facilities for teaching and Learning to a considerable extent, apart from usual chalk and black board.
- Continuous up-gradation and development of the infrastructure, library, enrichment of laboratory to meet the growing academic requirements.
- Various measures like tutorial classes, remedial courses, counseling, Language Lab classes are taken both advanced and slow learners for the sustenance of academic excellence.
- A feedback mechanism is in place and suggestions of the stakeholders (parents and students in particular) are given prominence.
- Imparting knowledge through experiment, workshops and seminars, Guest Lectures, Case studies, excursions.
- Academic planning for every subject well before the commencement of each semester.
- Study materials are shared with students.
- Academic Excellence Award is held to felicitate the merit students from junior and senior colleges with cash prizes.
- Best Library User award has been organized to promote reading habit.
- Teaching and Non-teaching faculty is recognized for their achievement in College Council meeting.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Unit Test, class seminars and oral tests are conducted by the respective faculty members and final examination is conducted by the University.
- Students absent from examinations are enquired about and monitored.
- Result Committee monitors the performance of students with low score in examination.
- Semester Pattern is practised for first year programmes whereas Second and final year programs are annual one at UG and PG level.
- Test and Exam Performance is evaluated through discussions with students and concerned teachers.
- Results are also recorded in teachers daily diary so that need based teaching methodology can be adopted.

Best Practice 1

- 1. **Title of the Practice :** Academic Excellence Award for students
- 2. **Goal :** This Practice initiated by the institute aims at recognizing meritorious students' excellent feat in academics. This certainly motivates them to expedite their upcoming academic voyage with zeal. By awarding cash prizes sponsored by the teachers to the meritorious and topper students from at college and university level, the students hard work in studies is taken care of. Students feel proud for being felicitated at the hands of reputed academicians in front of all the college students. They become role models to and inspire other students who lag behind in study for some or other reasons. This felicitation of students strengthens the teacher-sponsors and students bonding.
- 3. **Context**: After deciding the awards for particular classes and subjects in advance, it is obligatory on the part of institute to hand over the prizes to the toppers of the classes for whatever highest marks they score. At such time, this is disheartening to see that students though topper with fifty percent marks avail the benefit of being felicitated by the practice initiated by the college with a view to celebrate extraordinary results of the meritorious students.
- 4. The Practice: Academic Excellence Award is practiced to felicitate the students, from Junior and Senior wings of Nevjabai Hitkarini College who have topped at college and university level for the classes and subjects decided in advance by the consent of the teachers who are the sponsors (in large number), management and the retiree teachers. List of the topper students are make and displayed for any objection from students one week before the actual day and programme of felicitation. Invitation cards are prepared for the invited guests and the pride of the college i.e. topper and meritorious students.

 - ✓ Make possible meritorious and deprived students to earn a reasonable amount every month to meet their expenses.
 - ✓ Provide experience to the student and thereby making them competent for taking job in the future.
- **3. The Context : -** Institution is situated in rural part of eastern Maharashtra. Every year about 5,500 students enrolled for various courses in this institution. Most of the students are from socio-economically weaker section of the society. Now a day education become so expensive that such student from economically backward class can not have enough funds for their education. Hence such student need some special assistance to meet their expenses. Needy student from this class those have special skill like computer knowledge, DTP work, accounting, photography, laboratory work, get benefited through 'EARN AND LEARN SCHEME'.
- **4.** The Practice: In this institution Earn while learn scheme was started from 2007-08. College circulate notice about the scheme and invite student to apply for this scheme in the month of July in every academic year. Committee members search job-vacancies in various department of the institution as well as in local area. Required number of students have been selected through scrutiny by committee. Students are trained as per the job requirement. College also provide outdoor DTP and data entry work to the students.

Nature of work: In the laboratory students are engaged in preparation of solutions, handling, maintenance and storage of equipments, up-gradation of departmental data. In library they are trained in the activities like repair damage books, display of books, issue and return of books, data entry. In the office section students are engage in photocopy, data up gradation, compilation and analysis of data etc.

Fund :- student get Rs. 30/- per hour for this job and work maximum 3 to 5 hours a day as per the requirement of the student.
